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Direct from the DCT Diana Rancourt, Ph.D.

Hello USF Clinical Alumni, Students, and Friends! I can't believe we are almost at the end of the year! It has been a busy fall and will be a busy spring.

Despite the August heat, we had an excellent turnout at our fall Clinical Psychology Picnic at Rowlett Park where we reconnected and welcomed our three first year students. Faculty, students, children, and dogs were in attendance. There were multiple rounds of intense cornhole, and Marc Karver recruited students to play soccer – and no one developed heat stroke! A big thank you to Alex Rivera for his excellent party planning skills. I look forward to our next area gathering!

Our faculty and students continue to conduct excellent work that reflects our clinical science values. As examples, many of our students are conducting DBT with inmates as part of Dr. Edelyn Verona's work in the Center for Justice Research & Policy or providing substance use treatment as part of Dr. Rob Schlauch's NIAAA-funded alcohol recovery project. Fourth year student Allie Schuch is a recipient of funding as part of the Behavioral Health Workforce Education and Training Program, which is funded by the US Department of Health. Allie will receive specialized training in integrated behavioral health and develop a research project as part of this award. Importantly, this program integrates training and service by specifically focusing on increasing service to underserved populations in the Tampa Bay area. I couldn't be prouder of the work that our faculty and students do that has such far-reaching impacts.

We are excited about some coming program changes. First, we have revised the comprehensive exam process to better align our training with clinical science values. We eliminated the research-focused comprehensive exam and students instead will complete only one activity to demonstrate integrated knowledge across different core areas of psychology (e.g., social, affective, cognitive). In addition to an exam and major area paper options to meet this requirement, students will have the option to write a grant. Second, we received approval to hire a Visiting Assistant Professor who will be housed in the Psychological Services Center to help with therapy and assessment supervision, and other PSC-related teaching and tasks. If you know of anyone who would be a great fit, send them our way! Third, we have an active search for a tenure track Assistant Professor for the Clinical Area. I look forward to sharing more about these changes in the next newsletter!

I always welcome conversations about how we can continue to achieve more in all senses of our program's mission and values, so please don't hesitate to contact me. Thank you for your continued support of our program.

Welcome to the PSC Update for Fall 2023. As always, there is never a dull moment.


I want to begin by acknowledging our outstanding students and tremendous Clinic staff. Our Assistant Directors this year are Ruba Rum and Meaghan Brown. Glad to have you both here! As anyone who has worked in the PSC is aware, our CAs are really the heart of the operation. In addition to that, of course, I want to recognize our Administrative Assistant, Tasnim Mamun, whose support is also critical. As Spring Term ended, we bid farewell to Dan Faraci, who left for internship in California. Then, when Fall 23 term began, we said goodbye and thanks to Gabriella Silva – who, I am glad to say, still spends a bit of time hanging out with us in the PSC. As everyone who has been here knows, the PSC could not function without the dedicated work of our Clinic staff and students.

As the Fall term begins, we also welcome our new group of clinicians (our second-year students) into the clinic. Glad to have all of you joining us here and look forward to another great year! Your work is much appreciated, and I hope you will let us know if there is anything we can do to assist with your training needs.

Our work with the USF Athletics Department, providing achievement and psychosocial screenings of incoming student athletes, kept things busy during the Summer and into the Fall. This is beneficial for us in several ways; it provides opportunities for students to get assessment hours and practice, through both screenings and doing any subsequent psychoeducational assessments. It also offers us an opportunity to raise our profile in support of USF. We have also been coordinating with the USF Counseling Center as a referral source for some of their overload, which also helps us put the PSC on the campus map.

New this year is our collaboration with Dr. Rob Schlauch on his grant studying recovery from alcohol use disorder. His multi-year grant, funded by NIAAA, involves recruiting participants into treatment that is being provided by student clinicians in the PSC, with his participants being treated as PSC clients. It is great to have this opportunity to support research in the program, while it has also made the PSC a busy place. Some days space is at a premium. Of course, the clinic has always been a busy place. Our wait lists for all services are often long and we do our best to ensure that none of our prospective clients spend too long on the list. We continue to offer a broad range of services and training opportunities, from child to general adult therapy, substance use-related services, and our Dialectical Behavior Therapy (DBT) group. Across the board, demand remains high in all areas.

Speaking of our clinical training, we were fortunate to recruit some excellent adjunct supervisors this year to supplement our cadre of Clinical Faculty supervisors (me, Dr. Schlauch, and Dr. Verona). We are glad to welcome Dr. Kristi Weiner, an alumnus of the program, back to the PSC after taking some time away. In addition to Kristi, we welcomed back Dr. Karan Lamb, who continued with us this year. Lastly, welcome to Dr. Kirsten Ellingsen, who is in private practice in the local area, and Dr. Omar Rachman, who is on staff at Rothman Center for Neuropsychiatry. We appreciate everyone bringing your perspective to our clinic and sharing your time and skills with us!



Even though we have been back in the clinic for a couple of years now, I think it is accurate to say that we are still working through the effects of COVID on our training program. I am not sure that task will ever be completed. Given that we were fully remote as a training program and clinic, for about 18 months, much of our feeling of community, camaraderie, and program culture is taking time and continuing effort to rebuild. As we all know, successful accomplishment of our training mission is a team effort, with students at all levels, staff, faculty and even alumni working together to make the program and clinic successful. We continue to work toward those goals.

COVID not only affected our training and services in the short term, but also changed some of our training going forward. As most in the field know, telehealth has rather rapidly impacted us. In recognition of this, we decided to incorporate some level of teletherapy into our clinical training plan for third year and beyond students. This also required some changes in our environment and we were able to upgrade our in-room technology so that all telehealth sessions are held within the PSC. Those same technical improvements facilitate the recording of both remote and in-person sessions. Of course, some degree of telesupervision has also been blended into our training. It's a new world (note I did not say "better" or "worse").

Anyway, if that sounds like things are hectic here, then I have accurately portrayed clinic world. Would we really want it any other way? But for everything going on, we would still be more than happy to see any of our friends from years past. For instance, Dr. Mark Goldman dropped by this morning and Dr. Paul Jacobsen stopped by at lunchtime. So when or if you are in the neighborhood, please let us know and do stop by. 



This is a highly competitive fellowship program that provides an opportunity to work on Capitol Hill with a congress member on policies to advance the civil rights and/or health and well-being of LGBTQIA+ populations as well as any additional policy portfolios that may be assigned.
- **Dr. Peter Clayson** received the Award for Distinguished Early Career Contributions to Psychophysiology from the Society for Psychophysiological Research (SPR). SPR is an international scientific society aimed at promoting research on the relationship between physiological and psychological aspects of behavior. He was also selected by USF Research & Innovation to receive a Faculty Outstanding Research Achievement Award this year.
- Dr. Robert Schlauch received funding from the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism for a 5-year project entitled: Clinical Course of Alcohol Use Disorder Recovery.
- **Dr. Edelyn Verona**, in collaboration with Dr. Bryanna Fox, has obtained tremendous funding for the Center for Justice Research & Policy, including an ongoing \$1.2 million National Institute of Justice (NIJ) grant with the Pasco jail, a \$1.4 million NIJ grant in partnership with the Tampa Police Department, United States Attorney's Office, and Safe & Sound Hillsborough, a \$1.5 million BJA grant to the City of Tampa, a \$650,000 Centers for Disease Control and Prevention grant to Johns Hopkins, and contracts with the ACLU (\$15,000) and Foundation for Healthy St. Pete (\$46,000).

USF Clinical Psychology alumni Dr. Sylvia Herbozo and Dr. Yasmin Asvat founded PLANS -Psicologos Latinos Avanzando Nuestros Servicios - in 2020 to help address the underrepresentation of Latinos in Clinical and Counseling Psychology doctoral programs.

Only 6% of U.S. health service psychologists identify as Hispanic/Latino and only 5.5% are able to provide mental health services in Spanish. However, the demand for bilingual and culturally competent psychologists continues to increase. Data from the American Psychological Association makes it clear that the underrepresentation of Latino psychologists starts at the doctoral level, with only 15% of doctoral degrees in health service psychology awarded to those identifying as Hispanic/Latino. Diversifying the training to workforce pipeline is critical to increasing representation of Latino health service psychologists. This pipeline starts during the formative undergraduate training years.

PLANS' mission is to support the growth and success of Latino undergraduate students interested in becoming counseling or clinical psychologists. Students members of PLANS benefit from culturally relevant mentorship, networking, and resources designed to help them achieve their professional goals. PLANS is a grassroots organization that relies on the generosity of its volunteer mentors, all of whom are Latino clinical or counseling psychologists working in a variety of settings including psychology departments, academic medicine, and private practice. We believe that representation matters, and PLANS student members draw significant inspiration and encouragement from their mentor role models. We are proud to note that two of our current mentors are fellow USF grads - Dr. Brian Gonzalez and Dr. Ariz Rojas - thank you!

To date, PLANS has:

- -- Recruited 38 volunteer Latino mentors
- -- Received 195 student applications, including students at USF
- -- Matched 74 student members with mentors, including students at USF
- -- 8 student members have been accepted to PhD or PsyD programs
- -- An additional 3 student members have been accepted to Masters programs

We are excited for PLANS to continue to grow and help increase representation of Latinos in clinical and counseling psychology.
