I investigate how activists and other civil society members practice solidarity with migrants on the US-Mexico border. Why do caregivers persist in a struggle with no end in sight? I conducted participant observations for 14 months in a legal aid office and a migrant shelter to answer this question. In my manuscript I posit that immigration enforcement shapes the immediate needs of migrants by rendering them legally and physically dependent on movement organizations that provide direct services. As a result, care work becomes the everyday repertoire of solidarity, practiced in resource-scarce spaces through embodied commitments. Although burnout is ubiquitous, caregivers find motivation in familial moralities and manage exhaustion through calculated detachments.
