Chair's Column: Dr. Kim Golombisky

As we prepared for our 2024 Thinking Sex Conference on March 1, I realized we've been thinking sex for a long while. The conference theme, recognizing the 40th anniversary of Gayle Rubin's important 1984 essay "Thinking Sex," also commemorates our new department name: Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (WGSS).

We added "Sexuality" to our name last year not just to commemorate our 50th anniversary or to reflect the state of our academic discipline (or the state of the state, for that matter). Our new name recognizes our students' interests and commitments as well as our faculty and staff members' substantial expertise. The popularity of our new-ish Queer and Sexuality Studies minor proves it. We're also changing the names of our bachelor's and master's degrees, original WGS minor, and graduate certificate to reflect the WGSS name change.

By the way, in addition to celebrating WGSS' 50th anniversary last year,

we completed an academic program evaluation with reviews that made us blush. We credit Professor Diane Price Herndl for those successes. Diane just stepped down from her 10-year tenure as department chair, which is why you're reading my column here instead of hers.

Reflecting the College of Arts and Sciences' commitment to the new "S" in WGSS, we have been growing our faculty. Our newest faculty member Dr. Jessany Maldonado teaches intersections of race and sexualities. Dr. Lindsey Carman arrived last year as a visiting instructor supporting courses such as Queer Theory. Two additional permanent professors will join us in August, one specializing in race/gender/health and the other in queer cultures.

Meanwhile, Dr. Tangela Serls is serving her second year in a 3-year special assignment advising the dean on issues of inclusion and belonging. Dr. Elizabeth Bell retired to emerita status in December. Elizabeth changed our name from Women's Studies to Women's and Gender Studies in 2011 while serving as department chair.

Our staff has grown, too. Last fall we welcomed our new undergraduate advisor Shawn Mallory to our famous WGSS "purple suite." With degrees in ethnic studies and educational leadership, Shawn asked to be assigned to WGSS, and students couldn't be happier.

Sarah Jünke, our project coordinator, brainstorms and coordinates our always on-point WGSS events, programs, and projects, including this newsletter and our *Thinking Sex Conference*. She also gets credit for our amazing annual art installations. This year's show, *Quilting our History: An Exhibit of Quilts by Lauren Austin*, includes a series of events and workshops running into June. We are honored Lauren trusts us with her spectacular quilts. Don't miss the chance to see them in person.

Finally, last fall we successfully completed a Herdfunder fundraising campaign that resulted in 140 of our alumni and allies donating to the Marilyn Myerson Student Success Fund. Those 140 WGSS donations represent 29% of all USF's Herdfunder campaign donors last fall. On behalf of all of us in WGSS, thank you for that impressive showing. By the way, Marilyn also served as department chair, more than once.

I'm ending this column with fundraising to take the opportunity to ask you to give--to any of our scholarships. We build our support in small amounts, and we count success by the number of supporting gifts, not by their amounts. Please give \$10 or \$20 to the fund of your choice to support our students. 

Quilting Our History: An Exhibit of Quilts by Lauren Austin





The Department of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies is proud to host, *Quilting Our History: An Exhibit of Quilts by Lauren Austin*. The exhibit opened on February 12, 2024 and will close on June 21, 2024.

Lauren Austin is a Florida-based storytelling artist who has worked for over 30 years in the medium of quilts. Austin's work merges her own life story with that of Black history and cultural memory. Her quilts are large-scale mixed media pieces, incorporating photographic processes, stone lithograph, beading, hand-stitching, and hand-dyed fabrics.

Artist Statement: "I made my first quilt when I was 7 years old and have been quilting ever since. I worked as a Foreign Service Officer for the US State Department and later as a human rights lawyer. While I worked in the Foreign Service and in law,

I made art nights and weekends. I took the plunge in 2004 to create art full-time.

I use photos, my dyed, printed, and painted fabric to make my portraits of black life. I use different methods to add designs to my work, including retro photo-chemical processes, block printing, and lithography to create complex surface design.

Over the past 3 years I have been learning wood block and linoleum block carving and print making with Jennifer Harper of Harper Printmaking Studio in Eustis. By press printing my designs on fabric, I have a different method to add interest to my quilts.

Many of my quilts contain natural elements – leaves, flowers, birds, and animals. I want to create work that shows the relationship of black people with the natural world.

Making art helps me to understand my memories and feelings while making something beautiful. Art contains stories of the artist but also has room for the viewers' stories. For me, the process of creation, exhibition and audience involvement add value and meaning to my world. I hope you enjoy my work."

Thinking Sex Conference

MARCH 1, 2024 | TECO HALL, TAMPA CAMPUS

The USF Department of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies will host the *Thinking Sex Conference* on the USF Tampa campus on March 1, 2024, commemorating the 40th anniversary of Gayle Rubin's foundational *Thinking Sex: Notes for a Radical Theory of the Politics of Sexuality.* The keynote, "Thinking Sex Across Time & Space," will be presented by author and professor JE Sumerau. This conference is funded through ResearchOne.

First published in 1984, Rubin's piece contributed to the nascent and growing fields of LGBTQ+ studies, sexualities studies, and queer theory

by arguing that sexuality is not only a worthy but a necessary subject of conversation because sexuality is a key mechanism of political, social, and interpersonal control. In the forty years since, study of sexuality in its myriad forms and manifestations has burgeoned exponentially. This conference aims to explore, share, and debate current work in these fields taking place in the USF community.

The conference will take place from 9:30am-6:00pm in TECO Hall. Keynote will be from 1:00-1:45pm.

Keynote speaker: JE Sumerau (they/them) writes about the intersection

of sexualities, gender, health, violence, and cultural forms. They are the author of 7 novels and 5 nonfiction books including the Southern Gothic queer epistolary novel Transmission and a nonfiction exploration of masculinities entitled Violent Manhood. They are also the director of applied sociology at the University of Tampa, and the author of over 100 short fiction and nonfiction works published in varied literary, medical, and social scientific journals, magazines, and edited volumes. WGSS Affiliate Faculty: Dr. Nik Lampe

Dr. Nik M. Lampe is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Mental Health Law & Policy and a Faculty Affiliate in the Department of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies at USF. Their research program focuses on the behavioral health and healthcare disparities of LGBTQIA+ aging populations and the health of diverse older adults living with dementia and their family care partners. Dr. Lampe earned a Ph.D. in Sociology and a Graduate Certificate in Women's and Gender Studies at the University of South Carolina. Their dissertation research examined the healthcare, advance care planning, and health management experiences of transgender and intersex adults 65+ during the COVID-19 pandemic.

"As a new faculty at USF, I am currently teaching Cultural Diversity, Health & Behavioral Health, but I will be teaching Gender Diversity, Sexuality, & Behavioral Healthcare (GDSBH) starting this fall! I'm especially excited to teach GDSBH this fall to introduce students to behavioral health and healthcare

issues among LGBTQIA+ communities. Students will examine different areas of LGBTQIA+ behavioral healthcare and the origins and contours of health disparities impacting LGBTQIA+ people. This course will also offer evidence-based care practices and solutions for improving the behavioral health of LGBTQIA+ patients.

I joined the WGSS department as an affiliate last year because I consider WGSS to be one of my academic homes! My faculty advisor/ dissertation chair at the time was the director of the University of South Carolina's WGSS program, and I received a WGSS graduate certificate during my Ph.D. program for my work on improving the healthcare of trans, non-binary, and intersex older adults. The mentorship, support, and resources I received during my time at UofSC's WGSS program were instrumental in helping me achieve my professional and academic career goals. I hope to "pay it forward" now as a USF WGSS affiliated faculty and mentor!

I am very committed to the success of WGSS students and colleagues that I work with. Although WGSS is not my home department, I'm happy to support WGST undergraduate and graduate students in any way I'm able to. As someone who is an openly bisexual, transgender, and intersex faculty from a financially disadvantaged background at USF, I know how important it is to thoughtfully mentor and support students with diverse backgrounds and experiences."

WGSS Faculty: Dr. Jessany Maldonado

With an admiration and interest for how people function, Dr. Jessany Maldonado acknowledges that the Women's Gender, and Sexuality Studies department provides an avenue to investigate individuals as well as institutions. "Once you learn how individuals work from a psychological paradigm, you're then able to assess their motivations and agendas for how they run institutional systems," she says.

The WGSS department itself focuses include promoting social change, exploring human nature, and destabilizing systems of privilege and oppression, making it Maldonado's ideal workspace.

Being an Assistant Professor of Instruction at USF gives Maldonado the opportunity to express to others about black feminism, societal structure, positions of privilege, and her other topics of interest. In addition to this, a "student-centered collaborative environment" is how Maldonado feels she facilitates learning and discussion best. Lecturing is not only a professional duty for Maldonado, but it is also her opportunity to passionately discuss what is truly important to her.

Dr. Maldonado steers away from the traditional forms of teaching and wants her students to "hear themselves talk" as well as hear her. Her intention with this is to foster a dynamic exchange of perspectives and ideas within the classroom. "I feel as though it's a stronger pedagogy to co-create knowledge together with students," Maldonado says. This approach not only empowers students to engage actively in the learning process but also contributes to a more inclusive educational environment.

Many students should know that the courses that she teaches are one where "gears that have never been turned before are just now turning." She wants those interested in taking Introduction to Women's Studies to be aware that being uncomfortable is "a clear sign that you are learning." To elaborate, it may be uncomfortable at first to experience a class environment where misogyny, body image, sexual assault, and even violence may be the forefront of discussions, but "experiencing that discomfort is a symbol of growth," Maldonado says. Going beyond delivering lectures and running classrooms, Maldonado also provides a mentorship opportunity for her motivated students. With taking this role as a mentor, she directly helps her students work towards their professional and academic goals. This includes preparation for graduate school, application review, writing recommendation letters, and more. In Maldonado's own words, "When preparation meets opportunity, that equals success."

WGSS Faculty: Dr. Lindsey Carman Williams

"I'm always thinking about what it means to teach the feminist way in the classroom." - Dr. Lindsey Carman Williams

From supernatural fiction to the classroom, a feminist focus is what Dr. Carman Williams is all about. Carman Williams has an English Literature background from Washington State University, and it was this same place where she found her love for Women's Studies. "I took a graduate seminar in feminist theory which really just opened up my mind to how expansive this field is, and that's what really got me interested in this work." After working as a grader for Women's and Gender Studies professor at Washington State University, she was given the opportunity by her Graduate Student director to teach a course at the University, paving the way to where she is now.

Being a Visiting Assistant Professor of Instruction at USF now was an adjustment for Carman Williams since she was accustomed to her former Women's and Gender studies students at Washington State University. Yet after taking the leap, it has been nothing but incredible to her. "I really enjoy working with them, I have like 100 or so students and good class discussion, and just

seeing their knowledge develop over the course of a semester is really impactful for me and it shows me that this is why I'm in this field."

Dr. Carman Williams' passion for teaching is evident, and she feels that her pedagogy is "transformational". After each semester ends, Carman-Williams reflects on ways to make the class more accessible and flexible. She also strives to leave no voice behind. stating "I'm very intentional with which readings I assign my courses, especially in Intro, I want to make sure that those other representative voices and identities are the bulk of the readings that we're doing in class."

Along with this, she acknowledges the different learning styles, experiences, and standpoints there are within her classroom, and always caters to her readings to be as inclusive as possible.

When it comes to her class discussions, Carman-Williams' favorite lesson is about gendered violence and its application to real life. She states, "We talk about the different acts and definitions of gendered violence in class, just because I really believe that knowledge on the topic is very empowering, especially for students." This guidance and language especially allows for female students to both empower themselves as well as dissect

what perhaps has happened to them or to others that they know.

Additionally, Dr. Carman Williams wants others to know that she thinks there is a "misconception that this course is trying to indoctrinate or cause others to believe certain things, when really it is about the interrogation of, 'why is this the way that this is? Can we change this if it's not good?' -- that's what it's about." Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies attempts to dissect social issues and the root causes of them, it is not intended to push a political agenda onto others.

"I do all of my work from a feminist perspective." – Dr. Amanda Leblanc

Having a Women's Studies minor from University of Massachusetts
Dartmouth, along with degrees in
Media Communication from the
University of Colorado at Boulder,
Dr. Amanda Leblanc has immense
knowledge under her belt. Combined
with this, Leblanc's personal
experiences provide for insightful
lectures for her students, and she is
grateful for her position as a Visiting
Assistant Professor of Instruction.

Undergraduate studies at University of Massachusetts Dartmouth was a time of experimentation for Leblanc – "After undergrad, I didn't really know what I wanted to do but I was a Women's Studies minor and I knew that I wanted to further my feminist education." It turned out that after moving to USF for graduate school, "the Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies (WGSS) department here solidified that this was the kind of work she wanted to be doing." Although Leblanc ultimately decided to leave WGSS temporarily after

her M.A. in order to study Media Communication outside of USF, she states that "WGSS never left me."

Leblanc's background in media and communication is highly applicable to her WGSS pedagogy, as she states "WGSS and communications and media all work really well together for me and they are overlapping." Various backgrounds lead to her broad experiences, stating "I love the lessons that I learn and that I take with me."

Leblanc also adores how passionate her students are about her subject – so smart, informed, passionate, and even angry. During her lectures, Leblanc strives to keep in mind that she has as much to learn from her students as they do from her. She adds, "This is not a unidirectional flow of knowledge, but rather an exchange of knowledge." Leblanc is aware that students sign up for her courses because they care, so she always allows room for discussion.

What Leblanc wants those who take an interest in anything related to WGSS to know is that there is much more to a WGSS degree than what meets the eye - it is not a limited or abstract but rather a versatile and useful degree. "Not only is there a lot that you can do with it but we will help you get there as well." says Leblanc. WGSS Alumni from USF go on to do incredible things in all types of fields – from corporate America to public policy. In Leblanc's words, "not only are there jobs, but there are really great jobs that make a difference!"

WGSS Faculty: Dr. Kim Golombisky

"People always say, "What do you do with WGSS"...what do we not do?" – Dr. Kim Golombisky

Now serving as Chair for the Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies department, Dr. Golombisky has come a long way in her academic endeavors. With a background in advertising, journalism, and mass communications, women's studies was not her initial career path.

When facing everyday sexism in the journalism industry with her first graduate degree, she became aware of the very same issues that she teaches today. Golombisky went from "a mass communications professor studying feminist issues and media, and now I'm a Women's Studies professor studying media issues," in her words.

Golombisky most recently taught a graduate course in Feminist Research and Methodology; as a researcher herself in her own time, she enjoys delving into subjects like public discourses of gender, media representation, post-feminism, and post-racism.

Additionally, Golombisky states that she thinks it is "important to think

about the politics of the time that we live in, and education in terms of not just hostility towards education and free speech, but also hostility towards the very groups of people who we are trying to argue on the behalf of." In this sense, the barriers being placed by the State about what can and cannot be discussed, taught, or promoted are important to pay attention to. She states, "This too shall pass, as long as we stay true to our cause and stand up for what we believe in."

Golombisky is now the face of the WGSS department after being elected Chair in August 2023, and with that comes changes for her academic daily life. On one hand, Golombisky enjoys representing the department, stating that "Everyone is wonderful, everyone

is working toward the same goals for the department, and everyone cares about everyone else, so it's a really wonderful place and that's rare in Academia." On the other hand, being the Department Chair means teaching less and "I'll miss teaching my undergraduate and graduate students," Golombisky states. She cherishes the student connections she has now.

With WGSS being the broad field that it is, Golombisky emphasizes how useful this degree is and how this field is "trans-disciplinary." She states, "the issues we deal with are ubiquitous in every field and every discipline." Both undergraduate and graduate WGSS students go into a variety of fields whilst they maintain what she states are "social justice kinds of perspectives."

Whether working for political campaigns, elected officials, attorneys, office-setting jobs in corporate America, individually in real estate, human resources, and even going on to get Ph.D.'s or master's degrees in other fields, Golombisky wants others to know, "you name it, you can do it."

"I decided on an MA in WGSS because I enjoy the field's interdisciplinary nature. I had a WGSS concentration in my BA program and it allowed me to explore some cool ideas so it made sense for me to continue my studies with a WGSS MA.

I plan to research alternative subcultures in Florida, specifically the local emo and punk rock scene. I've found that the scene in Tampa is very queer with a big trans presence -- who better to research that than a queer alt transmasc who is already involved in and passionate about that scene? One

of my friends described me as "punk sun, emo moon, and goth rising" so I think I'm the right guy for the job!

After graduating, I want to continue

my research and discuss the overlaps between alternative subculture and transness. What work I've found on the subculture so far begins to address sexuality but really leaves out how trans-friendly, and even trans-led, the culture is. I'm starting to research that myself but would love to dive more into it as a PhD dissertation.

Pursuing a WGSS degree is helping me prepare for my future because I'm able to explore queer and trans rock culture in a supportive environment. The structure of the classes and conversations I've had with instructors have been so helpful in guiding me while I formulate these ideas. I've also found my fellow MA students to be wonderful collaborators and feel we help make each other stronger."

WGSS Degree Programs

Undergraduate Programs:

Major or Second Major in Women's, Gender, & Sexuality **Studies:** 36 hours (30 for second major). The major focuses on feminist research and practice. WGSS promotes social justice through the discovery and production of knowledge that emerges from feminist perspectives on culture and society.

Minor in Women's, Gender, & Sexuality Studies: 18 hours. This minor offers students from other majors the opportunity to learn more about feminist analysis, research, and activism.

Minor in Queer and Sexuality Studies: 18 hours. This minor trains students in the critical analysis of sexuality. It examines the rich history and cultural contributions of LGBTQIA people as well as the processes of normalization and pathologization that have structured sexual relations in different contexts.

Graduate Programs:

M.A. in Women's, Gender, & Sexuality Studies: 36 hours. The M.A. is useful for students and professionals who are preparing for advanced degrees, nonprofit sector employment, and those interested in broadening their understanding of WGSS topics. Deadline to apply for fall admission: February 15. Funding is available to students through graduate assistantships.

Graduate Certificate in Women's, Gender, & Sexuality **Studies:** 12 hours. The Certificate provides an opportunity for graduate students and other professionals to gain a more inclusive knowledge of women's, gender, and sexuality issues in society, including feminist studies.
