The inaugural conference, held January 29-30, 2020 at the University of South Florida's Tampa campus, will provide a forum for strategic thinkers, scholars, leaders, and subject matter experts to discuss, collaborate, and provide perspectives on each of the Great Powers' ability to influence the political, security, and economic issues in the Central Region.

Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad **U.S. SPECIAL REPRESENTATIVE FOR AFGHANISTAN RECONCILIATION**

Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad was appointed by Secretary Pompeo as the U.S. Special Representative for Afghanistan Reconciliation on September 21, 2018. Previously, Ambassador Khalilzad served as U.S. Permanent Representative to the United Nations 2007-2009, Ambassador to Irag 2005-2007, and Ambassador to Afghanistan from 2003 to 2005.

Prior to that, Ambassador Khalilzad served as Special Presidential Envoy to Afghanistan, and Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for Southwest Asia. Near East, and North African Affairs at the National Security Council, He also has been a Special Presidential Envoy and Ambassador at Large for the Free Iragis. Ambassador Khalilzad headed the Bush-Cheney transition team for the Department of Defense.

Between 1993 and 1999, Ambassador Khalilzad was Director of the Strategy, Doctrine, and Force Structure program for RAND's Project Air Force. While with RAND, he founded the Center for Middle Eastern Studies. Between 1991 and 1992, Ambassador Khalilzad served as Assistant Deputy Under Secretary of Defense for Policy Planning. He also served as a senior political scientist at RAND and associate professor at the University of California at San Diego in 1989 and 1991. From 1985 to 1989 at the Department of State, Ambassador Khalilzad was a member of the Policy Planning Staff and served as Special Advisor to the Under Secretary of State for Political Affairs, advising on the Iran-Iraq war and the Soviet War in Afghanistan. From 1979 to 1986, Ambassador Khalilzad was an Assistant Professor of Political Science at Columbia University.

Ambassador Khalilzad previously sat on the boards of the National Endowment for Democracy, America Abroad Media, the Center for the National Interest, the RAND Corporation's Middle East Studies Center, the Atlantic Council, the American University of Kurdistan, and the American University of Afghanistan. He was also a counselor at the Center for Strategic and International Studies and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations and the editorial board of the National Interest magazine.

Ambassador Khalilzad received his bachelor's and master's degree from the American University of Beirut, Lebanon. He went on to earn a Ph.D. from the University of Chicago. He is the author of The Envoy: From Kabul to the Whie House; My Journey Through a Turbulent World.

Lt Gen Thomas W. Bergeson is the Deputy Commander, United States Central Command, where he directs and enables operations and activities to increase regional security and stability in support of enduring U.S. interests.

He is a command pilot with more than 3.300 hours in fighter aircraft, including the F-15, F-22 and A-10C, General Bergeson has commanded a fighter squadron, operations group, fighter wing, and numbered air force. Opening Remarks DAY 1

Dr. Eric Eisenberg is a professor of communication, and since 2007, has served as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences at USF. Dean of the largest college at USF—with nearly 600 faculty, 18,000 students, and a budget of roughly \$100 million—Eisenberg sharpened the college's focus through the creation of three interdisciplinary schools, 22 departments, and 10 interdisciplinary research centers. Eisenberg played a significant role in the university's strategic efforts to improve student success through transformed pedagogy measurably. He twice received the National Communication Association award for the outstanding research publication in organizational communication, and the Burlington Foundation award for excellence in teaching.

LTG (R) Terry Wolff was appointed director of Near East South Asia Center for Strategic Studies (NESA) in February 2019 after serving as the deputy special presidential envoy for the Global Coalition to Defeat ISIS. He completed 34 years of military service and retired from active duty in February 2014. LTG (R) Wolff has extensive experience in Washington, DC, working military strategy, policy matters, and inter-agency affairs: nearly two years on the National Security Council as a special assistant to the president and senior director for Iraq and Afghanistan; over two years as the joint staff J-5; and 39 months as the deputy special presidential envoy, working part of the Obama and Trump Administrations.

Dr. Paul Sanberg is Senior Vice President for Research, Innovation, & Knowledge Enterprise, President of the USF Research Foundation, Distinguished University Professor of Medicine, Engineering, and Business, Executive Director of the Center of Excellence for Aging and Brain Repair at USF, and President of the National Academy of Inventors. Dr. Sanberg is widely recognized for his scientific and academic achievements. He is an inventor on 164 U.S. and foreign patents and author of more than 680 articles and 14 books, with more than 33,110 citations to his published work. As Senior Vice President of USF Research & Innovation (USFRI), Dr. Sanberg's vision and initiatives have established USFRI as a missioncritical central hub for the university's research enterprise in support of the university's strategic plan. USFRI promotes and supports the research and scholarship activities of faculty, staff, and students, and strives to make USF a leading national research university.

Dr. Todd Veazie serves as Director of the Strategic Multilayer Assessment (SMA) Office at the Joint Staff's Operations Directorate. SMA supports military leaders by assessing complex operational environments and technical challenges that require collaborative multi-agency, multidisciplinary, mixed-method approaches to expand strategic horizons and create effective strategy. Prior to reentering public service, Captain (R) Veazie was Chief Operating Officer at Kiernan Group Holdings, Inc. a global consulting firm specializing in law enforcement, risk services, defense, intelligence, and critical infrastructure resiliency. He served in the U.S. Navy, transitioned to the federal executive service, and was assigned to the National Counterterrorism Center, As a SEAL officer, he served in east and west coast SEAL Teams and deployed to over fifty countries around the globe.

Dr. Frederick Starr joined the American Foreign Policy Council as Distinguished Fellow for Eurasia in January 2017. He serves as the founding chairman of the Central Asia-Caucasus Institute. Dr. Starr is also a research professor at Johns Hopkins University-SAIS in Washington and head of advisory council at the Institute for Security and Development Policy in Stockholm. He has focused on the challenge of reopening continentalwide transport passing through Central Asia and Afghanistan, which he sees as the key to success in Afghanistan itself.

DAY ONE SPEAKERS **PANEL: Regional Perspectives on the Afghanistan Peace Process**

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Moderator

Dr. Andrew Wilder is vice president of Asia Programs, U.S. Institute of Peace. He first joined USIP as the Director of Afghanistan and Pakistan Programs. Before USIP, he was a research director for politics and policy at the Feinstein International Center at Tufts University. Dr. Wilder has conducted extensive research exploring issues relating to state-building, development, and stabilization efforts in Afghanistan and Pakistan. Recent research focuses on electoral politics in Afghanistan and the effectiveness of aid in promoting stabilization objectives in Afghanistan and Pakistan.



Ambassador Ali Jalali has served as a distinguished professor of International Relations at NESA since October 2005. He is a former Interior Minister of Afghanistan and Afghanistan Ambassador to Germany. As Interior Minister of post-Taliban Afghanistan, he created a trained force of 50,000 Afghan National Police (ANP) and 12,000 Border Police to work effectively in counter-narcotics, counterterrorism, and criminal investigation to fight against organized crime and illegal border crossings. As Afghanistan Ambassador to Germany, Jalali interacted with Germany and European Union on major bilateral and multi-lateral issues. During his military service in Afghanistan army, Amb. Jalali served in command, staff, and educational posts with a final rank of colonel.



Ms. Laurel Miller, director of Crisis Group's Asia Program, leads the organization's research, analysis, and policy advocacy about and in the region. Prior to joining Crisis Group, she was a senior foreign policy expert at the RAND Corporation, her research and analysis covering conflict resolution, democratization, institution-building, and anti-corruption in countries throughout the world. Among other assignments, Ms. Miller was the deputy and then acting special representative for Afghanistan and Pakistan at the U.S. Department of State.



Dr. Barnett Rubin, associate director of the Center on International Cooperation (CIC), oversees the Afghanistan Pakistan Regional Program. He was the senior adviser to the Special Representative for Afghanistan and Pakistan at the U.S. Department of State and special advisor to the UN Special Representative of the Secretary-General for Afghanistan during the negotiations that produced the Bonn Agreement. Dr. Rubin subsequently advised the UN Assistance Mission in Afghanistan on the drafting of the constitution of Afghanistan, the Afghanistan Compact, and the Afghanistan National Development Strategy.



Dr. Marvin Weinbaum, professor emeritus of political science at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign and Director for Pakistan Studies at the Middle East Institute, served as an analyst for Pakistan and Afghanistan in the U.S. Department of State's Bureau of Intelligence and Research. His research, teaching, and consultancies have focused on the issues of national security, state-building, democratization, and political economy in Afghanistan and Pakistan.

Dr. Mohsen Milani, founding executive director of the Center for Strategic & Diplomatic Studies and professor of politics at the University of South Florida, served as chair of the Department of Government and International Affairs at USF for thirteen years. During his tenure as chair, the department began a new Ph.D. program in Governance. Milani was a research fellow at Harvard University, Oxford University, and the Foscari University in Venice, Italy. Since 2000, he has been invited to 200 conferences in 27 countries. Both private and governmental entities solicit his advice.



Brigadier General Derek France is the Deputy Director of Operations, U.S. Central Command, MacDill Air Force Base. FL. He is responsible to the USCENTCOM Commander on all matters pertaining to the strategic and operational employment of assigned forces and the conduct of joint and combined combat operations and for the coordination of all aspects of operations to include air, ground, naval information operations, joint fires, and cyber and special operations forces in the USCENTCOM area of responsibility. General France is a Command Pilot with more than 2,800 hours in the F-15C and F22. He served as a Weapons School Instructor Pilot and Operations Officer, Deputy Detachment Commander, and Instructor Pilot in the Royal Saudi Air Force Fighter Weapons School in Dhahran, Saudi Arabia and commanded the 43d Fighter Squadron, Tyndall Air Force Base, FL, the 3d Operations Group Joint Base Elmendorf Air Force Base, Alaska, and the 325th Fighter Wing, Tyndall Air Force Base, FL.



Mr. Michael Singh, a Lane-Swig Senior Fellow, is managing director at The Washington Institute and former senior director for Middle East affairs at the National Security Council. During his White House tenure, He was responsible for devising and coordinating U.S. national security policy toward the region, stretching from Morocco to Iran, with a particular emphasis on Iran's nuclear and regional activities, the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, Syria, and security cooperation in the broader Middle East. Previously, Mr. Singh served as a special assistant to secretaries of state Condoleezza Rice and Colin Powell and at the U.S. embassy in Tel Aviv.



Ms. Barbara Slavin is the director of the Future of Iran Initiative and a nonresident senior fellow at the Atlantic Council, a lecturer in international affairs at George Washington University, and a columnist for Al-Monitor.com, a website devoted to news from and about the Middle East. She is a regular commentator on U.S. foreign policy and Iran on NPR, PBS, and C-SPAN. As a career journalist, Ms. Slavin previously served as assistant managing editor for world and national security at the Washington Times, a senior diplomatic reporter for USA TODAY, Cairo correspondent for the Economist, and an editor at the New York Times Week in Review.



Dr. Ariane Tabatabai, associate political scientist at the RAND Corporation and adjunct senior research scholar at the Columbia University School of International and Public Affairs, is a Truman national security fellow and a Council on Foreign Relations (CFR) term member. Before joining RAND, Dr. Tabatabai served as the director of curriculum, a visiting assistant professor of security studies at the Georgetown University Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service, and an international civilian consultant for NATO.

Mr. Shivers also served as the region's acting assistant secretary of defense toward the end of the George W. A Career Minister with the U.S. Foreign Service, Ms. Freeman was previously the Senior Deputy Assistant Administrator for the Bureau for Democracy, Conflict, and Humanitarian Assistance (DCHA). Prior to that, she served as Mission Director of the United States Agency for International Development (USAID) Kenya and the East Africa Mission. Before being appointed Mission Director in Nairobi, she was the Senior Deputy Mission Director in Islamabad, Pakistan. Other senior management positions include the USAID/Ethiopia Deputy Mission Director, where she directed more than \$530 million in relief during the humanitarian crisis, and the USAID Mission Director in Zimbawe, where her oversight focused on a program ensuring the well-being of the people during the height of hystoric hyperinflation, political transition, and violence.
