USF does **NOT** allow the establishment of joint degrees or dual degrees.

The first step is to initiate department-/school- and college-level discussions so, as the proposers, you may have confidence that the initiative will be supported. Discussions about resources, financials, academics, among others, are essential, so you enter into a clear understanding of what is needed before making commitments or creating any expectations about the possibilities of signing an agreement. As sponsor, it is your responsibility to inform the appropriate chair/director, dean, and global college representative about the proposal.

Mrs. Morales will be also the point of contact for questions regarding the process. USF World will work with the Office of Undergraduate or Graduate Studies, Office of Admissions and the USF's Accreditation Liaison/Academic Planning for review and consideration. Please remember, this multi-step process may take anywhere from a few weeks to several months, so we encourage faculty/staff to plan ahead and be proactive in the preparation and submission of documents.

The proposed agreement will be subject to more rigorous reporting and compliance requirements.</p>
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“International Cultural Agreements” may not: (1) constrain the freedom of contract of *such public entity*; (2) allows the curriculum or values of a program in the state to be directed or controlled by the foreign country of concern; or (3) promotes an agenda detrimental to the safety or security of the United States or its residents. Prior to the execution of any cultural exchange agreement with a foreign country of concern, the substance of the agreement shall be shared with federal agencies concerned with protecting national security or enforcing trade sanctions, embargoes, or other restrictions under federal law. If such federal agency provides information suggesting that such agreement promotes an agenda detrimental to the safety or security of the United States or its residents, the public entity may not enter into the agreement.
